

BGC Plant Stall at Bathurst Heritage Trades Trail 16th and 17th March

The plant stall was very successful despite the much needed overnight rain on Saturday which however caused some flooding of the outside of pavilions stall.

Records were broken all round compared to previous years in terms of more volunteers, more growers providing a wide variety of plants at bargain prices, more money taken in plant sales, hence more money donated to the 2024 BGCSS fundraising for local charities. The final details of this are not available as yet.

Thank you to all of those growers who provided plants for the stall. Thank you to the many volunteers who assisted with the set up of the stall early on Saturday morning, for fixing up the stall on Sunday morning after the flooding of the rain overnight, for the packing up of the stall on Sunday afternoon and for manning the stall throughout the 2 days.

A big thank you goes to Anne Bromfield for coordinating the stall and for the, as usual, beautiful arrangement of fresh flowers and vegetables (courtesy of Norm) from their garden. Along with the arrangement of "old" gardening items in line with the Heritage Theme, Anne created an impressive visual sight at the front of the stall.

Another special thank you goes to Karen Mitchell, who so willingly, at every plant stall, offers plant growers who are unable to bring their plants on Saturday morning, to place plants beforehand in the trailer outside the Scott Mitchell Plumbing business and deliver them to the plant stall. This year, Scott himself delivered them on Saturday. Karen is always willing to collect plants that growers don't want returned to them, after the stall is over and take them to the next Club meeting as give aways.

Some "Plants of Bathurst Gardens" books were sold with proceeds to the BGC, and there were many inquiries regarding joining the BGC and Club meetings. Flyers to promote the 2024 BGCSS were handed out to both locals and visitors from Sydney, Canberra, Blue Mountains etc, who had come to Bathurst as either a stallholder at the BHTT or as a tourist.

2024 BATHURST GARDENERS' CLUB SPRING SPECTACULAR REPORT from Larraine Griffin

To date 9 gardens are confirmed for the SS. We are hopeful of having 10 gardens soon, with 2 other gardens offered. Of the town gardens there are 2 in the Llanarth/Abercrombie area, 2 in the Kelso/Raglan area, including Lorraine and Ted Inwood's new garden of 18months and 2 within Bathurst itself. There is a variety of garden styles within the selection, something different for everyone to enjoy.

To date, 2 coach bookings for this year's event are confirmed, coming from Narrabri and Shellharbour Garden Clubs.







PLANTS THAT ARE DOING WELL IN FIONA'S GARDEN

This summer has been so unpredictable, I'm wondering what it has in store. October was horribly dry, then enough rain fell to keep the paddocks green, March brought more heat and dust.

Now we've had a couple of showers, just in time for autumn planting as the soil is still warm enough for new roots to grow before winter.

I'm a passionate advocate of autumn planting in Bathurst. My spring plantings never survived our hot, dry summers, though last year we risked a native hardenbergia (H. violaceae) under a new arch before our open garden. It hasn't looked back and I'm hoping will flower next spring.

A few, dry weeks are a good test of what does well with little or no extra water.



Alstroemeria butterfly hybrids were winners, their trumpet shaped, speckled flowers still appearing in pinks, yellows and a low growing white with cream variegated leaves, great for ground cover. I can imagine Spencer H. and Peter V. shaking their heads, "she'll regret this one day" but at the moment they're beautiful.

Hybrid alstroemerias flower for several months over summer.

Naked Ladies (Amaryllis belladonna) were also lovely. There was a small cluster of blubs near the garage when we moved here so I separated them and distributed them round the garden. They sulked for a year or two but have flowered ever since. The leaves die down before the flower stems appear in late summer, hence their name. The pink flowers have red stems and the white form 'Hathor's White' has green stems.

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Nerines (N bowdenii), on the other hand, have been a failure: no sign of them. It's still early for the lower growing white N. flexuosa alba so I'm hoping for more rain in April.

Sedums are reliably good and I'm slowly amassing a collection. I started with S. spectabile and it's still a favourite, though the cultivar "Brilliancy" is eye catching in a quiet corner. Good with Salvia nemorosa which repeat blooms if you cut the spring flowers back as they finish.

A new grass is doing well, Miscanthus "Yakushima Dwarf". While not actually dwarf as you can see (it's about waist high) it's more manageable than some of its assertive relations.



. Waist high Miscanthus "Yakushima Dwarf" is decorative for many months.

Eleagnus maculata is one of my best variegated big shrubs in a drought, with tiny white bells whose scent spreads for metres.



Eleagnus maculata (3-4 x 2 metres) has tiny, sweet smelling flowers in late summer.

Gardening in the sun is great if you can lay your hands on the right plants.
