# PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR FEB/MARCH 2024 NEWSLETTER

Hello Garden Club members, I hope you all enjoyed Christmas and New Year and that you are all looking forward to the year ahead. Our December meeting/ AGM was a big success, wonderful lunch and a successful AGM, recruiting some new members to help with the committee work, thank you for all of you who contributed. We still need someone to learn how to put together our newsletter, which Judy Bayliss is currently doing. Judy will be happy to teach you and I know through experience she is a great teacher. We also need one more ordinary member for G.C. committee.

Our committees for both Garden Club and Spring Spectacular have started planning and working on the many things our club has been involved with and your ideas are very welcome for all of our projects. Firstly, if you know of a garden that would be suitable for either our Garden Club meetings or Spring Spectacular, please let someone on the committee know, we need more gardens.

Heritage Trades Trail weekend is a bit earlier this year 16th and 17th March so while you are in your garden if you are dividing perennials or removing plants from your garden, why not pot them up for our plant stall. You can make some money, 2/3 of the cost of plant and 1/3 goes to the club. Some members donate all the money they raise to the club and all of these takings go towards Spring Spectacular. We have started seeking sponsors as well as we need money to pay for many things in our start up costs, printing, advertising, ticketing etc.

We will be asking for volunteers to be at the Heritage Trades Trail plant stall as well. This is a very enjoyable thing to do, shifts are only around 4hrs, and you get free entry to the Fair which is really interesting and informative. Of course, growing plants for food and shelter as well as for aesthetics and comfort was all important to our pioneers, so gardening is quite relevant to this fair which showcases the many skills needed in our early years as a nation to survive and thrive.

While you are in your garden maybe think about our seed bank which always needs topping up with newly collected seeds, so dry them out and bring them along to a meeting to share. It is wonderful to be able to access seeds of plants that thrive in our area, and they are all free compliments of our members.

Thought and some planning is being put into producing 3- or 4-day trips, we will let you all know when we have them organised. They are always really enjoyable days out with fellow Gardener Club members.

It has come to our attention that Fair Trading asks that we keep minutes of our Garden Club meetings. We would like to keep this task to a minimum amount of extra work for our secretary, who has a lot of work already, so minutes will include where we meet, who speaks and any major incidents that might occur, e.g. the outcome of any voting done by members like the defibrillator or any accidents any members might have while attending the meeting. These minutes will be available at the following meeting, , a copy will be available at the sign on desk if you are interested. I would think most members aren't that interested in reading them, but I will ask for a show of hands at our February meeting if you are happy that our ordinary members accept these minutes as being true and correct at our committee meetings.

The beginning of the year means that membership fees are now due, \$30 for new members and \$25 for existing members. If payment is not received by the end of March, we take it that you are not interested in being a member any longer so newsletter delivery will stop. Please let us know if your contact details have changed, phone number, address and email address. Most people have their newsletter delivered by email and this is our preferred method. We have 187 members at present and mailing newsletters 6 times a year would be very costly. So please if it is possible for us to deliver your newsletter by email let us know, this helps us keep the cost of running the Club down and in turn your membership fees.

For new members, we ask that you could order a club badge with your name on it, from Fifty 8 George St, to wear to meetings. You get a free raffle ticket for doing so as well!

Some of our Club's objectives are to educate in horticulture, to educate in protection and conservation of our natural resources, to encourage civic beauty, charity and to foster friendships and cordiality amongst members. Our club exists and continues to grow because of our combined efforts and members can contribute in many ways. We ask –

- if you know of a member who is not well or having a tough time, please let us know, our member welfare is important.
- -please remember club etiquette while at meetings. As gardeners we naturally want to propagate but we ask please do not remove any plants or plant material of any kind from gardens without the approval of the garden owner
- -please don't walk on any garden beds
- -please consider others at afternoon tea and also when taking free give aways at meetings.

The beginning of the year is a good time to remind us all of these simple things, we are a large group of gardeners and we don't want people dreading seeing us come to their garden.

I wish you all a year ahead that is one of good health and happiness and friendship through our shared interest in gardening.

## Fiona's Thoughts on the Spring Spectacular

One of the great things about opening your garden for our club's annual Spring Spectacular is that because you have to be organised before the big weekend, you're ahead for the rest of the summer.

The single best thing we did for our opening (I hate admitting this), was to replace two ancient wood pergolas that stood at each end of the lawn below our verandah.

One was nearly collapsing under the weight of a huge old banksia rose, and its slightly smaller opposite number was almost hidden by a massive wisteria. Also they were almost too low to walk under, as the supporting posts were slowly sinking into the ground.

Naturally I was sentimentally attachment to our old pergolas - like many gardeners I'm innately conservative about the garden - and strenuously resisted any change. But I was wrong: I love the new ones, which were finished just in time, and I'm enjoying watching two new creepers, Clematis montana Starlight and Hardenbergia violacea Happy Wanderer beginning to climb them.

Next, I had to act over the supposedly dwarf pittosporum Golf Ball plants that were rapidly growing into an impenetrable hedge round our fountain. It was nearly impossible to climb over them into the pond to clean the filter, so I (again reluctantly) replaced them with Mondo grass. The fountain is now splashing beautifully thanks to its clean filter and the pittosporums were perfect for a boundary hedge near the vegetables.

I also got several jobs done in October than normally wait until November, starting with clipping the box and viburnum hedges. They've only just started to shoot so should last the summer with no more trimming.

Best of all, thanks to being so well prepared for summer, I can now keep on top of - well, sort of - the weeding.

I would like to thank Larraine Griffin, BGC's committee and the large band of hard-working helpers for those long hours you spent behind the scenes to make the event such a success. And to wish you all the best for a spectacular 2024 event!
