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Hello fellow gardeners, I hope you are enjoying the change of season as I am. It is nice to see all the new growth and the old familiar faces in the flowers that come with Spring.

Our winter meetings have been very enjoyable and a topic which has dominated has been the acquisition of a defibrillator. The secret ballot voting was done at our September meeting and the votes were counted at the committee meeting the next day. An overwhelming majority voted to get a defibrillator, so Susie will compare prices for units that were demonstrated in our winter meetings. Hopefully we will have one by Christmas, which is not so far away.

In August I had the privilege of attending a morning tea for the presentation of money donated by the Bathurst council. This was a grant that was applied for by Chris Bayliss and we thankfully received \$500 to go towards the start up costs of Spring Spectacular.

With the warming of the weather in the coming months there has been many predictions for below average rainfall, higher temperatures and increased risk of bush fire. We have a responsibility for the efficient useage of water and we as gardeners can contribute by watering out of the heat of the day, careful choice of new plantings, mulching and promoting soil health. Soil health is so important for the ability of the soil to retain water. Plenty of organic matter, mulch, manure and the avoidance of chemicals will improve our soil.

All insects have their roles in the food chain. Aphids are food for ladybugs and praying mantis, snails are food for lizards and birds, dandelions are a source of pollen for bees and to poison one of these has major effects down the food chain and our environment. The overuse of super phosphate is a great example of the damage chemicals can do. Ground water is polluted and soils become depleted.

This is something I have become quite passionate about. I remember spraying around my window frames with Baygon years ago and I found all these dead bees on the driveway, it made me feel really bad. I think this was a lightbulb moment for me.

Our Spring Spectacular is fast approaching, I am sure many of you have been looking after the pots you have made up for the plant stall. It is good if a pot is well established and the buyers love something that is flowering. Tickets for the raffle will be available at next Garden Club meeting and we have some great prizes as usual. The opening for the Spring Spectacular will be at Bishop's Court in Seymour St, on 22nd October 2023, tickets are \$30, the food promises to be delicious and will be served with a champagne spritzer. It sounds lovely. We are still looking for sitters for the open gardens, Kate Baigent will be able to book you a place if you would like to volunteer. We as a club can be very proud of our efforts bringing about the Bathurst Gardeners Club Spring Spectacular. It is showcasing our home in the Central West, informing everyone of what grows well in this part of the world, it creates friendships with other Garden Clubs and it is a great fundraiser for our local charities. All this through our shared love of nature and gardening.

Coming up in October the Bathurst council is hosting a welcome lunch to new residents to the area. I will represent the Gardeners Club letting people know how to contact and join us. We may get some new members from it. Our membership is incredibly strong, 173 members at the moment, but we will always welcome new people who will have skills and knowledge to add to the collective. We would have hundreds of years of experience and knowledge from our combined memories between us, and we are using it to promote friendship through gardening and to give back to our community of Bathurst. 

Continue on and stay in the left lane in approx. 600m your will see an over-head sign "REPORT all Road Accidents".


Just after that on left there are two letter boxes. Turn and follow the fence line and signs to parking area.

What a hidden treasure! This garden offers space and easy maintain gardens. Large, bordered


garden beds full of plants are surrounded by large established trees.

September Flowerings from Fiona

I sometimes wish that Bathurst Gardeners' Club would relocate its Spring Spectacular to September. I can hear howls of outrage as I write –cold days! frost! gales! bare trees! – yet blossom and bulbs are so stunning September, it seems a shame we can only enjoy them with each other and not share with the wider gardening public.

Mind you I'm only saying this because our garden is open this year, the pressure is on and I'm terrified it won't look as good in late October as it does now. Let's pray it rains soon.

Sweet osmanthus (O. delavayi) is a hardy, medium size (1.2 to 1.5 metres) evergreen shrub from southern China with small, pointed green leaves and scented, starry white flowers emerging in late August, continuing for several weeks and lasting well when cut. It's hardier than O. fragrans (3-10m.) which apparently smells even better, but the specimen that I planted years ago has grown vigorously but to my acute disappointment, never flowers.

Several trees compete to bloom first in spring in my garden: this year Prunus x blireana won, producing masses of pink flowers a fortnight before P. x Elvins sprang to life.

Both are lovely small trees. P. x blireana has purple leaves slowly changing greenish purple before turning red in autumn. P. x Elvns has green foliage but its blossom is its greatest feature, covering the branches even more densely than that of sweet osmanthus, and opening white before eventually becoming dark pink.

Malus floribunda, on the other hand, starts life red and pink and finishes pure white. As far as I know it's the only crab that's immune to scab.

Pear blossom is supposedly fail-safe for September except, sigh, for me. To date I have lost two pear trees, a glorious snow pear (Pyrus nivalis) and a Williams fruiting pear, and I'm now worried my Manchurian pear is on the way out. It's looking sick and bore little blossom. I'm watering it anxiously and pouring on Seasol. Any suggestions gratefully received.

Luckily my Nashi pear, planted to cross fertilise the Williams, is doing well. It has the best blossom, if not the best fruit, and as pears are among my favourite fruit, I've planted another Williams alongside.

Viburnum carlesii, V. x burkwoodii, Mahonia aquifolium. Lonicera tartarica, tree peonies, tiny, sweet-smelling Gladiolus tristis - all flower in September, but I've run out of words. Happy gardening!
